Speakers

Dr Julia Baird was a co-convenor of Sydney MOW when still at Sydney University. In 2018 she was awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity by the University of Divinity. Recent books include *Victoria: The Queen (2016) and Phosphorescence (2020).*

Professor Eileen Baldry AO FASSA FRSN was a founding member of Sydney MOW and its inaugural secretary. In 2021 she was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia for "distinguished service to tertiary education, to criminology and to social welfare policy, and as an advocate for diversity, equity and inclusion".

The Rev'd Canon Mara Di Francesco is a Benedictine Oblate with a deep interest in spirituality, prayer, community and hospitality. She was appointed Rector of St Martin's Campbelltown (SA) in 2000 and is a Canon of St Peter's Cathedral.

Aunty Dr Rose Elu is a member of the Anglican Church Southern Queensland Reconciliation Action Plan Working Group, a Synod Representative for the Torres Strait Non-Geographic Parish, and an Executive Member of the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglican Council. She holds a PhD in Customary Law from the University of Hawaii and has done further post-graduate studies in Theology at St Francis College.

Ms Anne Hywood is the General Secretary at General Synod of the Anglican Church of Australia.

The Rev'd Canon Professor Dorothy Lee FAHA is Stewart Research Professor of New Testament at Trinity College Theological School and also an Anglican priest in the Diocese of Melbourne. Her most recent book is The Ministry of Women in the New Testament: Reclaiming the Biblical Vision for Church Leadership (2021).

Dr Elaine Lindsay is the National Secretary of MOW. She is the author of Rewriting *God: Spirituality in Contemporary Australian Women's Fiction (2000)* and co-editor, with Janet Scarfe, of *Preachers, Prophets and Heretics: Anglican Women's Ministry (2012)*.

The Hon Keith Mason AC KC served as Solicitor-General for NSW 1987-1997. He has been President of the NSW Court of Appeal and Chair of the NSW Law Reform Commission. He was Chancellor of the Anglican Diocese of Armidale 1990-2017 and has been a member and President of the Appellate Tribunal of the Anglican Church.

The Rev'd Dr Lesley McLean is the President of MOW. With Alison Gent, she initiated the group Women in Holy Orders? (WHO?) in Adelaide in 1980 and has been a member of MOW since its inception. She was the first woman ordained in the diocese of Bendigo in 1992 and was ordained priest in Melbourne in 1994. Her book *Woman The Church's Buried Talent (2018)* is four chapters on the struggle for the ordination of women from her PhD on Alison Gent.

The Rev'd Dr Colleen O'Reilly AM as a founding member of Anglican Women Concerned (Sydney 1975), was a pioneer in the push for women's ordination. She was ordained as a priest in Melbourne in 1995, retiring from St George's Malvern in 2019. She remains an adjunct lecturer at Trinity College Theological School. Colleen was recognized as a Member in the General Division of the Order of Australia in 2021 for significant service to the Anglican Church and to religious education.

The Rev'd Lu Piper OAM was ordained to the Diaconate in the Sydney Diocese in 1991 after serving as a Church Army Sister. In 1995 she was ordained to the Priesthood in the Newcastle Diocese. Her ministry has been in PNG and in Australia. Lu is a past Sydney convenor of MOW and is currently a National board member.

Dr Gwenneth Roberts is a senior lecturer in the University of Queensland School of Medicine. She is a parishioner at St John's Cathedral, Brisbane and a member of the ACSQ Domestic and Family Violence Working Group. She is also a MOW pioneer and the inspiration and principal researcher behind the exhibition, *From Biscuits to Bishop*, https://www.stjohnscathedral.com.au/womens-exhibition/

Mr Phillip Seale GDM (AGSM) has been the MOW Sydney Convenor for the past 3 years. Before that he was a long-term advocate of women's ministry.

Dr Jacqueline Service is a lecturer in Theology with a research focus in Trinitarian and Analytical Theology as well as a Theology of Social Justice at St Mark's National Theological Centre. She is a Trustee for the International Anglican Order of the Cross and has been actively involved in church ministries over many years.

The Rev'd Shannon Smith is Priest-in-Charge of St Mark's Golden Square and was recently appointed Diocesan Aboriginal Communities Officer. She is currently the Bendigo representative on the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglican Council. Shannon is a Wiradjuri woman from Darlington Point NSW.

The Rev'd Sr Elisa Helen Waterhouse CSC has been Provincial for the Community of the Sisters of the Church (Australia) and rector of St Paul's Anglican Church in Ballarat since 2019.

Timeline

1920 UK: Campaign to open the priesthood to women begins in the lead-up to the 1920 Lambeth Conference

1935 UK Report of a commission on the ministry of women appointed by Canterbury and York finds no compelling theological reasons for or against the ordination of women, but affirms the male priesthood "for the Church to-day"

1944 Hong Kong: Florence Li Tim-Oi ordained to the priesthood by Bishop Ronald Hall

1968 UK: Lambeth decides deaconesses are within the deaconate and evidence against women priests is inconclusive; all Anglican churches are urged to study the question of ordination

1969 General Synod rejects the 1968 Lambeth findings

1974 USA: Philadelphia 11 ordained as priests, including Rev'd Alison Cheek from Adelaide, by retired bishops

1975 Anglican Women Concerned set up in Sydney

1976 New Zealand votes to ordain women priests and bishops; ordains women priests in 1977

1980 Women in Holy Orders? set up in Adelaide

1983 MOW set up in Sydney

1983 MOW posting of the 12 theses (for the ordination of women) on the doors of St Andrew's Cathedral in Sydney (October)

1983 Action Group for Women's Ordination formed in Melbourne

1984 Monica Furlong visit to Australia; MOW National formed, Patricia Brennan first National president

1984 40th Anniversary of ordination of Li Tim Oi celebrated at Westminster Abbey. Alison Gent was among the 1,000 attendees

1985 First MOW National Conference, Sydney

1985 General Synod passes Ordination of Women to the Office of Deacon Canon but in Sydney Archbishop Robinson withholds consent

1986 The Rev'd Susan Adams (NZ) is licensed to preside in Melbourne

1986 First women deacons ordained in Melbourne by Archbishop David Penman

1987 Women Against the Ordination of Women set up in Melbourne

1988 MOW members go to Lambeth

1990 NZ: Penny Jamieson ordained Bishop of Dunedin, first diocesan Bishop in the Anglican Communion

1990 Bishop Owen Dowling, Canberra & Goulburn, first announces his intention to ordain women to the priesthood

1992 Archbishop Peter Carnley ordains 10 women priests in Perth (7 March) following the Supreme Court of WA's refusal (6 March) to issue an injunction

1992 General Synod passes Law of the Church of England Clarification Canon 1992 overturning Phillimore's Rule (November) and dioceses around Australia proceed to ordain women

2008 The Rev'd Kay Goldsworthy consecrated as assistant Bishop, Perth (22 May); The Rev'd Barbara Darling consecrated Bishop for Diocesan Ministries, Melbourne (31 May)

2012 The Rev'd Genieve Blackwell consecrated (31 March) and commissioned as Regional Bishop of Wagga Wagga. She was the first woman to be consecrated as a bishop in the state of New South Wales.

2013 Diocese of Sydney authorises female deacons (and priests licensed as such) to celebrate Holy Communion if their parish agrees

2014 The Rev'd Sarah Macneil consecrated Bishop of Grafton (1 March) and became the first woman in the Anglican Church of Australia to be selected as a diocesan bishop with direct responsibility for overseeing the affairs of the churches in her area

2015 Bishop Kay Goldsworthy elected Diocesan Bishop of the Diocese of Gippsland

2015 UK: The Rev'd Libby Lane consecrated Bishop of Stockport (January)

2018 Bishop Kay Goldsworthy installed as archbishop of Perth: the first female archbishop in the Anglican Communion.

The Movement for the Ordination of Women in Australia: a brief history

The Australian Movement for the Ordination of Women was founded in 1983 to advocate for the ordination of women as deacons, priests and bishops in the Anglican Church of Australia. Dr Patricia Brennan was the founding national President. She was succeeded by Dr Janet Scarfe in 1989. There were several pre-existing Australian state-based groups supporting the ordination of women, including:

- Anglican Women Concerned in Sydney was established in 1975 by Colleen O'Reilly and Zandra Wilson. Anglican Women Concerned organised a demonstration outside St Andrew's Cathedral during General Synod in 1977.
- Women in Holy Orders? was established in Adelaide on 30 May 1980 and the first meeting was held at the home of Alison Gent.
- Action Group for Women's Ordination in Melbourne was formed in 1983 as an umbrella group under the mentorship of Ryl Currey. Weekly services were held at St Oswald's Church, Glen Iris.

There were differences within these Australian groups about styles of protest and activism. Some members were uncomfortable in the public arena and feared that "engaging in political strategy and power games" might divert the issue from its spiritual path.

One of the first public actions by Sydney MOW members was in October 1983 when it glued its 12 propositions for the ordination of women on the door of St Andrew's Cathedral. The action was modelled on Martin Luther's 'Ninety-Five Theses'.

In May 1984, English author Monica Furlong accepted an invitation to tour Australia and was influential in supporting and energising the Australian campaign. The first of many national MOW conferences was held in Sydney in 1985. The key speaker at the 1985 conference, 'Telling Tales', was the Reverend Alison Cheek, a South Australian woman who had been 'irregularly' ordained priest in the Episcopal Church in 1974 (one of the 'Philadelphia Eleven'). Cheek was not permitted to publicly celebrate the Eucharist, but she did preach in Melbourne. In Brisbane, Archbishop Sir John Grindrod instructed clergy that Cheek was neither to preach nor take part in any formal procession into a church. Cheek visited Australia many times and was a key supporter of MOW, appreciated as a model of sacramental ministry by a woman. At that same conference, Caroline Pearce was blessed by the 200 participants prior to setting off to study theology in the United States, where she was subsequently ordained, before returning to Australia in 1989; her priestly ministry was finally recognised in 1992 when General Synod made it legally possible for women to be ordained as priests. MOW was particularly active in arguing for women's ordination in the court of public opinion, often through the secular media, but the decision to ordain women had to be made by the Anglican Church of Australia – it was a legal matter and different dioceses had different opinions on the matter. In 1968, the Lambeth Conference requested regional churches (including the Australian churches) discuss women's ordination, but it was not until 1985 that the Australian General Synod passed the Ordination of Women to the Office of Deacon Canon, which conferred authority on bishops of any dioceses that adopted the Canon to ordain a woman as deacon. This opened the way for women to progress to

priesthood, although that was not confirmed until 1991 by the Appellate Tribunal.

Australia's first Anglican women deacons were ordained in Melbourne on 9 February 1986 by Archbishop David Penman. Opponents of the ordination threatened the Archbishop with legal action and the ceremony itself was delayed when the report of a bomb forced the evacuation of St Paul's Cathedral. The eight women ordinands included Kay Goldsworthy, one of the last women deaconesses appointed in Melbourne, and Kate Prowd. Goldsworthy subsequently became the first female Archbishop in the Anglican Church of Australia and Prowd was appointed assistant bishop in the Diocese of Melbourne in 2018. MOW members from around Australia attended the 1986 ordination service.

In 1991 Bishop Owen Dowling of Canberra announced that he intended to ordain eleven women as priests on 2 February 1992. This was challenged in the Supreme Court of New South Wales and the NSW Court of Appeal subsequently restrained Bishop Dowling from ordaining the female candidates. MOW was well represented at the 'non-ordination' as it became known; it was a distressing event, both for the women involved and for many members of the wider church community who were aghast that a secular court had been drawn in to adjudicate on the matter.

Civil proceedings were also commenced in Perth when Archbishop Peter Carnley announced that he was ordaining female priests, but the Supreme Court of Western Australia refused to grant an interlocutory injunction. Thus it was, on 7 March 1992, the first women priests were ordained in the Anglican Church of Australia in Perth, even though General Synod did not overturn the late 19th century English church law (the Phillimore Rule) that said women were incapable of

ordination until November 1992. MOW members were present in Perth to witness ten women being ordained, amongst their number, Kay Goldsworthy. MOW members were present at each of the ordinations that took place in most Australian dioceses in 1992. By the end of 1992, 90 women had been ordained, and the overseas ordinations of two more women had been recognised, hence the MOW slogan, "92 in '92".

In 2007, the Appellate Tribunal ruled that dioceses could elect female bishops if they had already accepted female priests. Kay Goldsworthy was the first woman appointed a bishop in the Anglican Church in Australia in 2008, subsequently followed by other female appointments.

MOW changed its name to MOWatch in 2014, following the lead of the English Movement for the Ordination of Women. However, it reverted to MOW in 2017, in recognition of the fact that several Australian dioceses, the most powerful of which, the Anglican Diocese of Sydney, still refuse to ordain women priests.

In 2022, MOW continues its commitment to challenging and transforming the Anglican Church of Australia and its role in the community. Its September 2022 national conference, Unfinished Business: celebrating Anglican women's ministry in Australia, is being held in Sydney to honour those who fought for women's ordination over many years; it celebrates the courage and service of ordained women and reminds Australians that there are still dioceses that limit or refuse to acknowledge women's ordained ministry.
